## LIBERTY TOWNSHIP ROLLS OUT LIBERTY LIVING LEGACY PROGRAM

With a new program entitled “Liberty Living Legacy,” Liberty Township is providing an avenue for residents to consider during estate and/or property planning. The concept centers around the preservation of individual’s real property and voluntary donation of such property (or however the owner desires it be handled) for park purposes.

The Township’s literature addresses the idea of “the way you remember it, is the way it could always be.” It poses questions like this:

- What will happen when we’re gone?
- Will our property become a sub-division? A strip mall or a gas station?
- Will our children want to sell it? Will they have to?

The idea evolved from the Parks Committee according to Township Administrator Dina Minneci. “We have to thank the members of the parks committee for their time and dedication to bringing this idea to a reality. It’s a great concept for people who may already be considering different options on the future of their property,” said Minneci. The Township will provide information related to the Township’s overall Comprehensive Plan, future land use plan and pertinent zoning info to property owners who want to better understand the Township’s development vision, but will not give legal advice or prepare legal documents. To ensure the property owners’ interests are protected, the Township encourages individuals to work with their financial planner and/or attorney.

“We appreciate the time the committee members have taken to think through the program and we hope some residents and/or families find the information helpful. Two good examples of this concept in our community are Allen Park and Dudley Memorial Park,” said David Kern, Trustee and Liaison to the Parks Committee.

# PLANNING AND ZONING NEWS

## TRUSTEES CONSIDER REGULATING VEHICLES PARKED ON RESIDENTIAL STREETS IN RIGHT-OF-WAY

The Liberty Township Trustees are considering regulating the parking of certain recreational vehicles—namely mobile homes, RVs, campers, trailers, semi-trucks, portable storage units and dumpsters—within the public right-of-way in residential districts.

The resolution will define the types of vehicles prohibited, the size of such vehicles (vehicles exceeding 84 inches in width) and the length of time vehicles are permitted for loading/unloading/cleaning purposes. The idea is to eliminate these vehicles from permanently being parked within the public right-of-way, public streets or alley ways in residential districts for these reasons:

- ◆ They create an unsafe traffic environment, in particular impeding the safe passage of emergency and service vehicles;
- ◆ They interfere with sight distance visibility;
- ◆ They create extra wear and tear on the roads; and
- ◆ They harm the aesthetics of the community and reduce property values.

## NUISANCE COMPLAINTS OFTEN INCREASE IN THE SPRING

With Springtime comes a natural increase in nuisance complaints. The Liberty Township Zoning Department responds to nuisance complaints, including tall grass, weeds, garbage, refuse or other debris in yards, in accordance with Ohio Revised Code Section 505.87.

- ◆ Once the Liberty Township Zoning Department receives a written complaint regarding the conditions of a property, staff completes a site inspection and takes photographs of present conditions. If the property is deemed to be in violation (i.e. grass 8" or greater, excessive weeds, garbage, refuse, or other debris) the property owner is notified and given ten (10) days to correct the violation.
- ◆ After ten (10) days, the site is re-inspected. If the violation has not been corrected, the property will be put on the next available Liberty Township Board of Trustees agenda to be declared a Public Nuisance.
- ◆ A copy of the Public Nuisance notice will be posted on the property and the property owner and lien holders will be provided a copy by certified mail giving the property owner seven (7) days to abate the nuisance.
- ◆ Seven (7) days after the property owner and lien holders are notified that the property is a Public Nuisance, the property is re-inspected. Any violation remaining at this time will be corrected by the Township, with the cost of the abatement placed on the owner's property tax bill.

### WHAT IS IDENTITY THEFT? INFO & TIPS from the BUTLER COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Butler County Sheriff R. K. Jones wants to make everyone aware that identity theft has become a major concern to law enforcement throughout the United States. It is the fastest growing crime and affects more than 500,000 new victims each year. We have all heard horror stories about fraud resulting from stealing a name, address, social security number, credit cards, etc. Here is some critical information in an attempt to limit the damage in case this happens to you or someone you know.

#### What is Identity Theft?

Identity theft, or identity fraud, is the taking of a victim's identity to obtain credit cards from banks and retailers, steal money from a victim's existing account(s), apply for loans, establish accounts with utility companies, rent an apartment, file bankruptcy, or obtain a job. Millions of dollars are stolen by these methods without victim's becoming aware of the problem for months or even years.

The imposter obtains the victim's social security card number, date of birth and other identification data such as his or her address and phone number. Armed with this information, the thief can obtain a fictitious driver's license, apply for instant credit, or pose as the victim through mail transactions. Often the criminal will claim that he or she had just moved, and will provide a different address. All of this information is in the victim's name. Once the first account is opened, credit is used to the limit, and funds are drained from all possible sources.

# FIRE DEPARTMENT FLASH

## BUTLER COUNTY ANNOUNCES NEW EMERGENCY INFORMATION HOTLINE...513-785-5800

The Butler County Emergency Management Agency (EMA) and the Butler County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) have announced a new emergency information hotline for all Butler County residents. The information hotline will be available for notifications of snow emergencies, emergency incidents, severe weather alerts or any type of incident within Butler County. This system will allow multiple users at one time to receive vital information on the status of the County any time day or night, 365 days a year. The system is also intended to give information to a specific area of the County that might only be affected. The emergency info hotline has already been in use in Butler County for road closures during the January gasoline tanker accident on I-75 and damage reporting during the earthquake in Indiana earlier this year. Butler County Sheriff Richard K. Jones explained that during a snow emergency, people flood the dispatch center calling 911 asking if a Level 1 snow emergency is in effect. The dispatchers are busy handling emergencies and this new system will allow an alternative to calling 911. The system is being funded by the Butler County Emergency Management Agency.

The County-wide emergency information phone number is **513-785-5800** and will be updated as needed by either EMA or the Sheriff's Office.

Many large cities and counties across the country use a similar type system. The hope is that citizens of Butler County will see a message scrolling across the bottom of their television screen with "Butler County Emergency Information Hotline 513-785-5800" and will call to get the status of the county. ## LIBERTY TOWNSHIP FIRE DEPT. RECEIVES GRANT

The Liberty Township Fire Dept. has received a \$690 fire prevention grant from FM Global, one of the world's largest property insurers.

FM Global rep Steve Pitigout presented the award to Assistant Chief Dan Bailey (above) at the Liberty Township Fire Headquarters earlier this year. The grant funds will provide photo/ion smoke alarms to residents that can not obtain the safety device otherwise.

"We wanted to use the grant dollars to assist with local fire prevention activities and to help educate Liberty Township residents as we work to make our community safer. The idea of offering dual sensor smoke detectors to residents who need them seemed a perfect opportunity to put the grant dollars to work right away," said Assistant Chief Dan Bailey.

## NEW PROGRAMS FORMING AT NEW ACTIVITY CENTER

Located in the former library on Cox Road, the new West Chester Activity Center is holding enrollment for a variety of arts and fitness classes for the community.

The Center opened in November and currently offers a wide variety of activities for people age 55+. The Center is also developing classes for youth and young adults including hip hop dance and art classes.

## TIPS FOR SELF PROTECTION (Identity Theft Story Continued)

- Never give out personal information over the phone, through the mail, or over the Internet unless you are the one that initiated the contact and are aware of the party that you are dealing with. Be cautious of those posing as bank representatives, credit card personnel and even govt. officials that are seeking personal info. It never hurts to get their number to verify validity and call them back.
- Use a paper shredder on all personal documents.
- Avoid using your mother's maiden name, your date of birth, social security number, or a similar series of numbers as any form of a password. These identifying factors can easily be obtained from records and used against you.
- Never carry your social security card, passport, birth certificate, or other identifying papers unless it is absolutely necessary.
- Photocopy the contents of your wallet (both sides) so you will know what you had in your wallet and the account and phone numbers to call and cancel. Keep the photocopy in a safe/secure place. Also make and carry a photocopy of your passport when you travel.
- Never put your social security card number on checks or credit card receipts.
- Avoid putting telephone numbers on checks. Put your work phone number on your checks instead of your home phone. If you have a PO Box, use that or a work address instead of your home address.
- You should report seeing anyone in someone else's mailbox since this is how Identity Theft happens.
- Be careful when you use ATM and phone cards. Someone may be looking over your shoulder to get your PIN, and ultimately be able to gain access to your account.
- Make a list of all of your credit card account numbers and bank account numbers with the customer service number available for each one, and store this list in a safe place.

**Contact the Butler County Sheriff's Office if you are a victim: 513-785-1300.**

- When you order a new credit card, or are due to receive a replacement for an expired card, watch the calendar to make sure that you get the card(s) within a reasonable amount of time. If the card does not arrive when expected, call the credit card grantor immediately to find out if the card had been sent, and make sure that the address was not changed to another location.
- Do not put your credit card number on the Internet unless it has been encrypted on a secure site.
- Pay attention to your billing cycles. Follow up with the creditor if a bill does not arrive on time.
- A missing credit card bill could indicate that a thief that has changed the address on the account and is using your identity.
- Consider canceling all credit cards that you have not used in the past six months. Open credit is a prime target.

### IF YOU ARE A VICTIM

- File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where the items were stolen.
- Contact all creditors, by phone and in writing, to inform them of your problem.
- Call your nearest U.S. Postal Inspection Service office.
- Call each of the credit bureaus' fraud units to report identity theft and ask to have a "fraud alert/victim impact" statement placed in your credit file asking that creditors call you before opening any new accounts.
- Alert your banks to flag your accounts and contact you to confirm unusual activity.
- Request a change of PIN and password.
- Keep a log of all your contacts and make copies of all documents.
- Contact the Ohio Department of Motor Vehicles to see if any license was issued in your name.
- Request a new license and file a fraud complaint if any license was issued in your name.
- Contact the three major credit report sources listed in the box above. Also call the Federal Trade Commission at 1-877-IDTHEFT.
