## LIBERTY TOWNSHIP NEW BUSINESS UPDATES

In the last three months, Liberty Township has seen more new businesses open. **Hot Head Burritos** along Cincinnati-Dayton Road next to Starbucks opened in March and celebrated with a ribbon cutting. Local franchisees Zach and his father Kevin Martin (pictured center at right) look forward to serving the Liberty Township community.



There has been a lot of activity in the Township's SR 747 corridor with the Princeton Landings retail center filling up. Three Cincinnati-based brothers (pictured front right, below) opened **Eli's Sports Bar & Grill** in the center. This is the third Eli's in the Greater Cincinnati area. **Subway**, **Envi Nail Salon**, and **Lapel's Drycleaning** have also opened recently in the same center. In addition, **Dr. AnnMarie Matusak's pediatric dental office** is under construction along SR 747.

# ROADS AND PARKS UPDATE

## HACKBERRY TREE MEASURED FOR STATE OF OHIO'S "BIG TREE LIST"

A large Hackberry tree which lies just outside of Dudley Woods in Liberty Township, was measured earlier this year by arborist Tom Robison for submission to the Ohio Department of Natural Resource's Forestry Division. Robinson measured the tree by climbing it, and it measures 97 feet, 9 inches high with a circumference of 244 inches. The two measurements for the crown spread were 102-feet, 2-inches and 84-feet, 6 inches.

"Trees are awarded points using a formula that takes into account measurements of their height, circumference and crown. Trees within five points of one another are listed as "co-champion," said Brian Riley, Ohio's Big Tree Program coordinator. This happened in 1997 with the Liberty Township tree and a tree in Findlay, Riley said. "The last time I measured in 2003 there were seven points separating the trees," he said. "It's been eight growing seasons. I can see the tree being reinstated as co-champion—or even champion."

Trustee Dave Kern first noticed the large Hackberry tree nearly 14 years ago and called state offices with his calculations. Later Riley came out to measure it. The updated tree list will be posted online later this year.

## LOOKING FOR AN OUTDOOR ACTIVITY FOR KIDS THIS SUMMER?

The Liberty Township Trustees and Parks Committee are re-launching the "Parks Passport Program" designed to engage families with the Township's park system.

"The Parks Passport Program is a great way for kids and families to visit nine parks throughout Liberty Township. It was an idea originally created by the Parks Committee and after seeing how it worked the last couple of years, we have made improvements and are excited to get it back out into the community. It's a great activity for parents, grandparents or other care givers to do with children this summer, and it gets kids outdoors," said Rick Plummer, Services Director.



Children and their families are encouraged to pick up a Parks Passport from the Liberty Township Administration Building at 6400 Princeton Road. When ready to visit the first park, take a crayon, pencil or colored chalk along with the Parks Passport booklet and look for the kiosk with the Parks Passport Station sign. Rub an impression from the placard which is attached to the kiosk onto the passport booklet. Then, have fun and explore the park! Once all nine parks are visited and impressions from each have been recorded in the Parks Passport booklet, return the completed passport to Liberty Township to receive a wristband and coupon for a free ice cream cone.

The following Liberty Township parks are featured in the Parks Passport Program—Allen Park, Cherokee Park, Dudley Memorial Park, Fort Liberty Playland, Liberty Park, Maud Hughes Incline, Reserves Park, The Wetlands East and West. ## GRASS, WEEDS, JUNK, DEBRIS, JUNK VEHICLES COMPLAINTS—HOW THEY ARE HANDLED

The Liberty Township Zoning Department works on a **COMPLAINT ONLY** basis for all nuisance properties. Please stop by the Township Administration Building or visit our web site at [liberty-township.com](http://liberty-township.com) to fill out and submit a "Resident Complaint Form." The Zoning Department will then inspect the property and pursue any necessary action upon verification of complaint.

Per Ohio Law, it may take several weeks from the time a complaint is filed until the Township can legally take steps to abate the nuisance. All costs associated with nuisance abatements are assessed to the property.

## 2010 U.S. CENSUS DATA HAS BEEN RELEASED

Liberty Township continues to grow in population, especially with new and growing families. The 2010 U.S. Census population figure for Liberty Township is **37,259**—an increase of 63% from the 2000 figure. The Township uses the U.S. Census data to help evaluate service needs, plan for future development, determine the type of development needed for the community, attract commercial development, perform planning studies, plan festivals, determine park demand and locations for future parks, evaluate cemetery needs, create population projections, identify infrastructure needs (lack of public water or sewer) and more. One theme that continues to come from the data is that Liberty Township is a family-oriented community. More data points are to be released in the coming weeks, and we will share more in our next newsletter!

## DON'T FORGET YOUR LIBERTY TOWNSHIP ZONING PERMIT

Please note that almost all construction activity will require the issuance of a Zoning Permit **PRIOR TO STARTING CONSTRUCTION**. This includes, but is not limited to new construction, fences, pools, decks, additions, pergolas, gazebos, sheds, garages, pole barns, remodels, basement finish, anything related to commercial, home occupations, and the like. The Zoning Department processes Zoning Permits for homeowners, developers, builders and contractors. With the exclusion of fences and sheds (less than 200 sq. ft.), all applications that come through the Liberty Township Zoning Department, must then be taken to the Butler County Building Department for the application of a building permit.

# FIRE DEPARTMENT FLASH

## OUTDOOR WEATHER WARNING SIRENS IN LIBERTY TOWNSHIP

Liberty Township often receives questions as to the effectiveness of the outdoor weather warning sirens. The sirens are designed to audibly warn residents that are out-of-doors that potentially dangerous weather is approaching and to seek shelter and a more definitive source of weather information. Liberty Township has seven sirens strategically placed to cover the largest area with emphasis on places that tend to have outdoor activities such as schools, parks, playgrounds, pools, golf courses, etc. For these sirens to be effective in warning residents inside their homes and other enclosed buildings the levels would need to be such that they would be extremely uncomfortable if not dangerous for anyone that would be in the immediate vicinity of them when activated.

Just a reminder, the sirens are tested at noon on the first Wednesday of each month. This test is canceled in the event that threatening weather is occurring at the time of the test. We also encourage residents to look into some of the advantages of the weather alert radios or electronic notifications services available for more comprehensive weather information. The home weather alert monitors are available in most electronics stores and usually can be obtained for less than \$40. Some local grocery stores were also offering these radios as well. These devices have the added advantage of warning of all weather related hazards including flood warnings, ice and snow events and heat dangers to name a few. Some of the local television stations even offer to send alerts to individual cell phones.

## LIBERTY TOWNSHIP PARAMEDICS FUNCTION WITH SWAT

Liberty Township employees **Chad Canupp**, **Brandon McCroskey** and **Lt. Jason Knollman** are training with the Butler County Regional SWAT team as tactical paramedics. While in the early stages, they are becoming proficient in the normal operations of the special weapons and tactics unit. In addition to the 8 hours of training each month, Chad and Jason have completed an 80-hour Tactical Emergency Medical Services class. This will allow them to function as an integral part of the team. While it is not unusual for a paramedic unit to be on stand-by at the scene of a SWAT operations they are normally staged well away from the hot zone. This arrangement will allow for much quicker medical attention in the event that a hostage or a police officer is injured during a tactical operation. **Chad and Jason** (pictured at right) are career firefighter/paramedics with Liberty Township Fire Dept. Brandon is a full-time Police Officer with Fairfield Township PD and a part-time firefighter/paramedic with Liberty Twp. Arrangements such as these are gaining momentum around the country and show the increasing cooperation between police, fire and EMS. The SWAT team itself is comprised of officers from several police agencies including Butler County Sheriff's Office, Fairfield Township PD and Trenton PD. The various agencies have designed and are administered by a memorandum of understanding (MOU). The SWAT team responds to approximately 20-25 callouts per year ranging from high-risk search warrants to hostage situations.




## FIREWORKS: DON'T TRY THIS AT HOME!

As we approach the July Fourth holiday and the September Labor Day celebrations we are inundated with questions and concerns about fireworks. The only types of fireworks that can be legally discharged by the average resident in the state of Ohio are trick and novelty items also known as Exempted 1.4G Fireworks. These include items such as sparklers, glow snakes, smoke bombs, snaps and similar devices. Traditional devices such as firecrackers, bottle rockets, fountains and roman candles are classified as 1.4G Fireworks—and while they may be purchased by residents over 18 years of age from a licensed manufacturer or wholesaler—they can not be legally discharged in the state of Ohio. When purchased in state the purchaser must sign a form stating that they will transport these devices out of the state within 48 hours. Aerial shells and other shells that are shot from mortars are classified as 1.3G fireworks and can only be discharged by a licensed exhibitor with a valid permit in accordance with Ohio laws.



# FINANCE DEPARTMENT REPORT

## LIBERTY TOWNSHIP'S 2010 FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

In 2010, Liberty Township had several financial highlights. A new fire station and additional salt storage facility located at 5170 and 5172 Princeton Road were opened for business. Both of these projects were completed on time and under budget. New cardiac monitors and AED's were purchased to replace older equipment. These improved public safety service resources came in \$17,000 under budget. In addition, several vendor contracts were negotiated and renewed which will save the Township \$73,000 over the next three years. Moreover, over \$103,000 in grant funds were received for Dudley Park playground equipment, an EMS stair chair, ambulance stretcher replacements and smoke detectors for public distribution. A new snow plow truck was purchased under budget and increased the snow plow routes to a total of 13 for improved roadway safety and efficiency. None of these cost savings could have been possible without the due diligence and fiscal conservative oversight of the Township.



For 2010, the total revenues were **\$20,671,904** compared with total expenditures of **\$18,688,750**. The net result was a surplus of revenue over expenditures of \$1,983,154. This surplus is largely due to the increased residential incentive district and joint economic development district revenue as well as the cost savings on capital purchases/projects, vendor contracts and grant funds received.


Such surpluses are placed in reserves for future infrastructure and safety service projects which will improve quality of life for Township residents as well as account for losses in revenue that will be occurring due to the State of Ohio's cuts to local government tax distributions.

Moreover, there are other revenue streams that the Township received which helped to offset some of the expenditures. For example, Liberty Township received \$19,000 in recycling revenue which helps fund the Township's 11 parks. This was a 9% increase over last year due to the increase in residential diligent efforts to support recycling. Another example is \$31,000 the Township received for participating in the Bureau of Worker's Compensation discount program and the Greater Hamilton Safety Council. Participation in such programs helps ensure the Township is providing an effective risk management program for the safety of its employees and residents.

Overall for 2010, the Township's operating expenses came in under budget by 15% and revenues exceeded budget by 34%. This is more important than ever with the anticipated revenue cuts to aid local government just announced in the State of Ohio's Biennial Budget.

Trustees and staff work hard on a daily basis to ensure they are being good stewards of the taxpayers' dollars.
