LIBERTY TOWNSHIP EMBARKS ON VISION PLAN UPDATE

The Liberty Township Board of Trustees has announced the official start to the Township's comprehensive plan update. The Vision Plan is an update to the Township's 2006 Comprehensive Plan which was designed to be a 20-year planning tool to be updated about every five years. With Liberty Township at the five-year mark, a Vision Plan Steering Committee has been formed representing the interests of residents, Township businesses and community stakeholders. The Vision Plan Steering Committee will guide the process through a series of work sessions as well as a few public open houses to garner additional feedback from the community. **The first public open house is slated for April 25 from 5—8 p.m. at the Township Administration Building (6400 Princeton Road).**

The comprehensive plan provides a vision for the future. As time passes, the environment changes, development patterns change and what has been developed all change the landscape of our community. The plan becomes a guideline that is used on a daily basis to direct future growth, preserve environmental features and plan for greenways, parks, quality of life assets and to ensure that Liberty Township is a sustainable community.

"It's critical we properly plan for the future of our community so this is a priority project designated by the Board of Trustees for Liberty Township in 2012. The Vision Plan update will help us best direct our efforts to promote the growth of our commercial tax base with minimal impact on existing residents while preserving the character of the Liberty Township that more than 37,000 people call home," said Christine Matacic, President, Liberty Township Board of Trustees.

Liberty Township expects to have a draft of the Vision Plan by year's end. A new tab under "Planning/Zoning" has been created on the Township's web site – www.liberty-township.com – to post updates and meeting information.

NUISANCE COMPLAINTS OFTEN INCREASE IN THE SPRING

With Springtime comes a natural increase in nuisance complaints. The Liberty Township Zoning Department responds to nuisance complaints, including tall grass, weeds, garbage, refuse or other debris in yards, in accordance with Ohio Revised Code Section 505.87. Complaints may be made by filling out the Resident Complaint Form in person, by mail, fax or email. The form is on the web site under "Planning/Zoning." Please refer to the ORC section above, however here is a summary of the steps involved with a nuisance complaint.

- ⇒ Once a written complaint is received, a site inspection is completed and photos of the nuisance are taken. If the property is deemed to be in violation (i.e. grass is 8" or greater, excessive weeds, garbage or other debris) the property owner is notified and given 10 days to correct the violation.
- ⇒ After 10 days, the site is re-inspected. If the violation has not been corrected, the property will be put on the next available Liberty Township Board of Trustees agenda to be declared a Public Nuisance.
- ⇒ A copy of the Public Nuisance notice is posted on the property and the property owner and lien holders will be sent copies by certified mail giving the property owner seven days to abate the nuisance.
- ⇒ Seven days after the notifications are received by the property owner and lien holders, the property is re-inspected. Any violation remaining at this time will be corrected by the Township, with the cost of the abatement placed on the owner's property tax bill.

RESTROOM FACILITIES ADDED TO DUDLEY MEMORIAL PARK

Over the last year, Dudley Memorial Park has experienced quite a facelift—thanks to a couple of grants that have made the park improvements possible. It started about 18 months ago when a new boundless playground designed for children of all ages and abilities was installed at the park. The playground equipment—pictured below—was the result of a successful Community Development Block Grant application through Butler County. Most recently, the Township received a NatureWorks Grant through the Ohio Department of Natural Resources to add restroom facilities to the popular park. The restrooms and paved path were completed this past fall. Another new feature at the park—the driveway and parking lot were paved late last summer in order to make the park more accessible for residents and families. Dudley Memorial Park is located at 5700 Yankee Road.

The Township Trustees and Parks Committee have re-launched the “Parks Passport Program” designed to engage families with the Township’s park system.

“The Parks Passport Program is a great way for kids and families to visit nine parks throughout Liberty Township. It was an idea originally created by the Parks Committee and it’s a nice activity for parents, grandparents or other care givers to do with children this spring or summer,” said Rick Plummer, Services Director.



Children and their families are encouraged to pick up a Parks Passport from the Liberty Township Administration Building at 6400 Princeton Road. When ready to visit the first park, take a crayon, pencil or colored chalk along with the Parks Passport booklet and look for the kiosk with the Parks Passport Station sign. Rub an impression from the placard which is attached to the kiosk onto the passport booklet. Then, have fun and explore the park! Once all nine parks are visited and impressions from each have been recorded in the Parks Passport booklet, return the completed passport to Liberty Township to receive a wristband and coupon for a free ice cream cone.

FIRE DEPARTMENT FLASH

EXPLORERS POST #2895 IMPORTANT TO FIRE DEPARTMENT

Liberty Township Fire Department has continually sponsored a Firefighting and Emergency Medical Services Explorer post since 1978. The Exploring program is Learning for Life's career education program for young men and women. The Explorers Post #2895 specializes in potential career guidance and experiences.

Many of the youth that have been a part of the Explorers Post have gone on to engage in the Fire Service and EMS field as a career in one form or another. The members that did not pursue the profession as a career benefit personally from the first aid, CPR, fire safety and disaster preparedness skills that they gained through their involvement with the program. Membership is open to anyone that is at least 14 years of age and has completed the 8th grade. Explorers can remain active until their 22nd birthday. They are not permitted to be an Explorer if they become employed as a firefighter before their 22nd birthday. Liberty Township Fire Dept. also requires that members maintain passing grades in school and be of good moral character.



In addition to training and practicing non-hazardous evolutions and skills the cadets participate in routine daily station activities including cleaning, care and maintenance of equipment. Advanced members are permitted to shadow fire department staff in certain situations and thus experience the career first-hand. Post #2895 regularly competes against other regional Fire and EMS post in the annual Explorer competition held in late spring at Scarlet Oaks Joint Vocational School. The Liberty Township Explorers Post participates in the annual Butler County



September 11th Memorial Ceremony. They have visited the Cincinnati Fire Museum (photo at top) and the Fallen Firefighter's Memorial (photo at left) on field trips to learn all aspects of the rich firefighting traditions. During Christmas Break 2011 the group volunteered at a Hamilton area "soup kitchen" (photo above) in order to appreciate the blessings that they enjoy.

MEMORIAL BENCH HONORS RED HASKELL

Lawrence "Red" Haskell, a lifelong resident of Liberty Township and a Charter Member of the Liberty Township Volunteer Fire Department, passed away in December 2011.



Red was an active member with the Fire Department for more than 40 years and served as Assistant Chief for approximately 25 of those years. He also served as Acting Chief of the department for a brief period.

Asst. Chief Haskell lived most of his adult life in the Maustown area of the Township (SR 747 between Millikin & Kyles Station Rd) and as such was often the engineer of the department's original 1953 pumper. It was only fitting that Red made his final journey on the apparatus that he cherished so much. His casket was transported to the cemetery on the fire engine loaded by LTFD members past and present.

Several members were looking for a fitting way to honor Red and so the idea of a memorial bench idea began taking shape. Past Asst. Chief Scott Elliott (pictured below) was the guiding force on the project with assistance from several others. The bench is in use at Fire Headquarters as a practical monument for future generations. Trustee Kern is also facilitating the planting of a Red Oak tree in honor of Red at Station 111.
