## NUISANCE COMPLAINTS OFTEN INCREASE IN THE SPRING

With Springtime comes a natural increase in nuisance complaints. The Liberty Township Zoning Department responds to nuisance complaints, including tall grass, weeds, garbage, refuse or other debris in yards, in accordance with Ohio Revised Code Section 505.87. Complaints may be made by filling out the Resident Complaint Form in person, by mail, fax or email. The form is on the web site under "Planning/Zoning." Please refer to the ORC section above, however here is a summary of the steps involved with a nuisance complaint.

- ⇒ Once a written complaint is received, a site inspection is completed and photos of the nuisance are taken. If the property is deemed to be in violation (i.e. grass is 8" or greater, excessive weeds, garbage or other debris) the property owner is notified and given 10 days to correct the violation.
- ⇒ After 10 days, the site is re-inspected. If the violation has not been corrected, the property will be put on the next available Liberty Township Board of Trustees agenda to be declared a Public Nuisance.
- ⇒ A copy of the Public Nuisance notice is posted on the property and the property owner and lien holders will be sent copies by certified mail giving the property owner seven days to abate the nuisance.
- ⇒ Seven days after the notifications are received by the property owner and lien holders, the property is re-inspected. Any violation remaining at this time will be corrected by the Township, with the cost of the abatement placed on the owner's property tax bill.

# FIRE DEPARTMENT FLASH

## WHAT RESIDENTS SHOULD KNOW ABOUT LIBERTY TOWNSHIP'S WEATHER WARNING SIRENS

Liberty Township provides and maintains seven outdoor weather warning sirens. These sirens are strategically placed throughout the township to provide maximum coverage of areas that traditionally have large groups gather out of doors such as parks, school yards, golf courses and similar venues. These devices are intended to provide an audible warning to persons in such outdoor areas. Their function is to alert citizens to take shelter and seek definitive weather information from television, radio or other media.

The sirens in Liberty Township are activated by the West Chester Communications Center under a Butler County-Wide Tornado Siren Activation protocol. The sirens will be activated when any part of Butler County is placed under a **TORNADO WARNING** by the National Weather Service or when a tornado has been spotted by a "credible witness." A credible witness is defined as: a trained weather spotter, law

enforcement officer, Fire/EMS responder, etc. The sirens may also be activated by order of the Butler County Emergency Management Director, Sheriff, Fire Chief or their designee.

We encourage residents to also take advantage of other means of becoming aware of severe weather such as emergency weather alert radios. These devices are relatively inexpensive, readily available and can be programmed to announce a variety of additional weather conditions such as flooding, snow/ice storms, thunderstorms, etc. There are also an endless list of applications for smartphone, I-pads and other electronic devices that can provide advanced warning and are often free. Most of the local television stations offer such services. One good source of conditions and emergency information is the **Butler County Emergency Information Line** at **513-785-1200**.



All sirens within the county are tested on the 1st Wednesday of the month at Noon. The tests are not conducted when there is the possibility of severe weather on that day. The sirens in Liberty Township are located at:

Residents may also be able to hear sirens from neighboring jurisdictions that may or may not follow the same protocol. Please feel free to contact Liberty Township Fire Department or the Butler County Emergency Management Agency for additional information or if you have questions.

## BUTLER COUNTY TEAM AIDS HURRICANE VICTIMS; LTFD CAPTAIN LIMERICK PARTICIPATES

In the wake of Hurricane Sandy last fall, thousands of emergency responders and volunteers rushed to the East Coast to aid victims of the storm. Among those responding was the Butler County All Hazards Incident Management Team. Ten members of the team, made up of firefighters and law enforcement officers from Butler County traveled to New York City on Oct. 30, 2012.

The team was tasked with organizing and operating a Logistical Staging Area for the New York City Office of Emergency Management. A Logistical Staging Area is a receiving and distribution center for emergency supplies such as generators, pumps, lights, food and water. The staging area was set up on the parking lot of Citi Field in Queens, requiring close coordination between the NY Mets organization, NYC Office of Emergency

Management and the team. The team developed a check-in and inventory system to track each individual piece of equipment. As requests for supplies and equipment were placed through the city's Logistics Center, the team filled the orders and updated the inventory. With the inventory system developed by the team, filled orders and current inventory could be viewed in real time by city officials at off-site locations.

Although the teams' original job was to manage the city's equipment, their duties escalated to include materials from several agencies as relief supplies poured into the city. In addition, the team was asked to manage overnight parking for the hundreds of utility workers arriving to restore electrical



power to the city. Eventually about 600 line trucks and nearly 1,000 utility workers passed through the staging area each day.

One of the most common questions asked of staff at the MidPointe Library System is "do you offer ebooks?" The answer is a resounding "YES!" Not only does MidPointe offer multiple services to access ebooks and audiobooks, their collection of digital download offerings has grown extensively and now features magazines and music. The recent addition of "Zinio" brings the world's largest newsstand to the MidPointe service area. Zinio offers a vast collection of popular, downloadable magazines in digital format. This service is compatible with a number of devices, including PC, Mac, iPhone, iPad, Android, Kindle Fire and Blackberry Playbook. "Freegal" is an online music service and is unique in that the songs are free to download and keep. With access to the Sony Music Entertainment catalog, it offers thousands of songs, more than 100 genres of music, and more than 50 record labels. No special software is needed to use the service and MidPointe patrons can download 5 songs a week.

With the digital download collection available through MidPointeLibrary.org, these materials are easy to access using Library computers or with your own PC, tablet or phone. As with all offerings from the MidPointe Library System, these services are free. Patrons need only a MidPointe Library card and PIN number. MidPointe has also developed new programming options to compliment these recent technological additions. From classes such as "All About iPad Apps" and "Library Website 101," to one-on-one tutorials with a librarian about how to download ebooks, the MidPointe Library System is prepared to assist the community with their growing needs. ## LAKOTA SCHOOL DISTRICT—NEW STRATEGIC PLAN

The Lakota School District has started work on a new strategic plan, teaming with the community to lay out a path that will guide the schools for the next three to four years. Planning for the future, while providing services today, is key for public organizations. Liberty Township has been working on an update to its 2006 Comprehensive Plan, a 20-year planning tool that is updated about every five years. For the Lakota Schools, the previous strategic planning process, conducted in 2005, created a strategic plan that concluded in 2012.



The focus of the school district's 2013 strategic planning process will be to prepare students for their future while at the same time provide for a sustainable school system. The planning process includes work to assess Lakota's strengths, competitive advantages, challenges, and opportunities. It also will require the school district to re-evaluate its central mission and core values, as well as create a vision for the future. And it will help the school district capitalize on its competitive advantages.

A strategic planning team consisting of district employees and community members is evaluating where Lakota is currently and where it needs to go to prepare students for their future. The new strategic plan, designed to advance both Lakota's educational program and the school system itself, is expected to be completed by June.

## BUTLER COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE BIKE PATROL UNIT

In case you see Deputies on bicycles, Liberty Township has three deputies that are also assigned to the bike patrol unit of the Butler County Sheriff's Office, they are: Deputies Eberle, Green, and Hensley (See picture at right, Deputy Hensley not pictured). When weather and manpower permits they are allowed to ride the bikes in neighborhoods/parks. They patrol in the night as well, so they can stealthy use the cover of night to see/hear things a regular patrol unit may not. This is another tool to aid in crime prevention/detection in Liberty Township that Sheriff Richard K. Jones utilizes.

All members of the Butler County Sheriff's Bike Patrol Unit's members have completed specialized training and their patrol cars are equipped with special carriers so their bikes can be quickly mounted and deployed. Each bike has special equipment to include sirens and flashing lights. The bikes are marked with reflective material the same as all motor units.

New members to the squad are put through a rigorous training course. Each member is required to pass Slow Remover Ability Course using cones. The next phase is to train and pass a 30 mile Cross Country Ride. The course consists of steep grades and sharp curves. The Third and final phase in the mandatory training is Firearms proficiency. Deputies must fire their weapon at a target while mounted on their bike. Next they ride for a distance and, while semi-winded, they must conduct a sliding dismount, run toward and fire at their target with a passing grade. All of the Liberty Bike Patrol Deputies have completed these requirements.
