LIBERTY TOWNSHIP VISION PLAN UPDATE TO RESIDENTS

The Liberty Township Vision Plan Steering Committee continues to meet on a monthly basis to prepare updates to the Liberty Township Comprehensive Plan that was adopted in 2006. A Comprehensive Plan provides a vision for the future of Liberty Township and as times change, the environment changes, development patterns change, and what has been developed forever changes the landscape of our community. The Comprehensive Plan is a guideline that is used on a daily basis to direct future growth, preserve environmental features, and plan for greenways, parks, quality of life and to ensure that Liberty Township is a sustainable community.



A Public Open House was held on April 25, 2012 to gather feedback from the residents of the community. The Open House was attended by approximately 40 people. The public participated in several “Value Statement Surveys.” The results are provided below. Another public open house will take place later this year—join the Liberty E-News (see yellow column at right) to stay informed.

Commercial Value Statement #1

With only 18% of all land in the Township planned for commercial/ office development, it is important to hold true to the long-term vision of high quality, sustainable development even if it means, in the short term, turning away development which does not fit the Township’s vision. **22 votes**

OR

It is more important to grow our commercial base now with any available development, even if that development is not keeping with the long-term vision of high-quality, sustainable commercial development. **2 votes**

Commercial Value Statement #2

Development should be of a high aesthetic quality (natural building materials, increased landscaping, modest signage, etc.) even if it means that we lose some development opportunities to surrounding communities with lower aesthetic standards. **18 votes**

OR

Liberty Township should be no more restrictive on development than neighboring communities to ensure that we don’t lose development opportunities due to development restrictions. **6 votes**

Residential Value Statement #1:

With the current recession, we should temporarily relax standards for residential development to adapt to market demands by allowing smaller lots and less expensive houses to be built. **1 vote**

OR

It is important to maintain a focus on high-quality and high-value housing stock, even if it means slower growth in the short-term. **23 votes**

Residential Value Statement #2

It is important that Liberty Township be a place with a variety of housing options attractive to all age groups. One should be able to live in Liberty Township during each phase of life: from childhood, young adulthood, raising a family, through retirement. **20 votes**

OR

Liberty Township should be about large single-family homes on relatively large lots similar to the current housing stock in the Township. **4 votes**

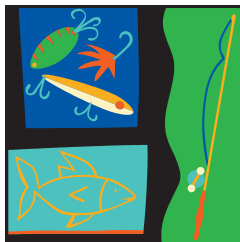

SAFETY WARNING: SKY LANTERNS

Sky Lanterns, also known as Chinese Floating Lanterns, are becoming a new fad occasionally used at weddings, birthdays or other events. They are a sort of mini hot air balloon that consist of some type of biodegradable bag that is heated by a fuel brick. These are often a simple bag with a printed message or design. They are also available in various shapes such as a hearts, stars, etc. Once ignited they will float up into the sky and drift on the existing wind currents several miles until the fuel is consumed



and they drift back to earth. According to the Ohio State Fire Marshall Office these devices are considered flame-effects and must only be displayed by a licensed exhibitor and require a special permit. As always we encourage everyone to leave the fireworks and other pyrotechnics to the professionals at a properly regulated and safe display. Although legal even the consumer grade fireworks and devices sold in many area stores can cause severe burns and injury when not used properly and with safety in mind.

DUKE ENERGY'S GRID MODERNIZATION PROJECT UPDATE

Duke Energy, the company responsible for providing electrical power to the homes in Liberty Township is currently modernizing their electrical grid within the community. Duke will be initiating a Grid Modernization Program, by installing new "digital" meters on homes, communication boxes on poles, instituting a new customer technology program and making their distribution system more automated.

What does this mean? Typically when there is a power outage due to storms, a traffic accident, or animals chewing on the lines, a Duke Energy crew is dispatched to the scene of the outage and they have to search for the source of the outage. Sometimes it is easy to identify the source of the outage, sometimes it can prove very difficult. What the Grid Modernization Program will accomplish is allow the system to do one of two things (or both): It will allow power to be automatically rerouted around the area that is affected and/or it will alert the Duke Energy crews to exactly where the outage is occurring. This should allow fewer people to be affected by any outages that may occur. These benefits will become available after the system is built out.

The new meters to be installed on the homes are also an integral part of the system. The Grid Modernization project also allows each homeowner to go on-line to see daily usage, peak times of usage, and other pertinent information that homeowners can use to cut down on energy usage and save money. More information about the on-line system and time of use rate programs will be included in electric bills once the new meters are installed and certified.

The two companies completing the Grid Modernization for Duke Energy are Bowlin Energy and Contract Callers, Inc. All contractors are required to carry proper identification specifying that they are contractors for Duke Energy. 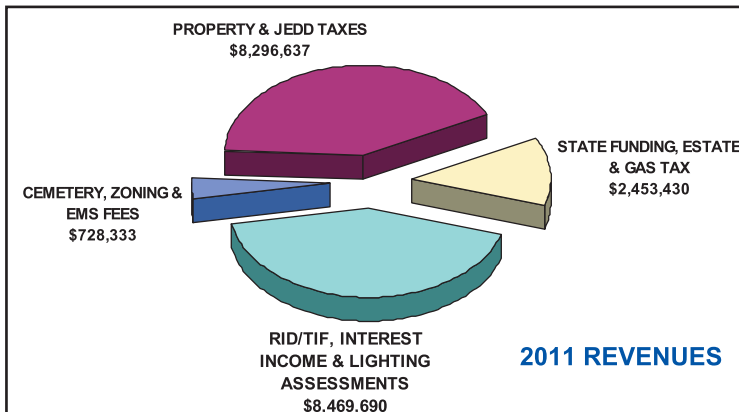

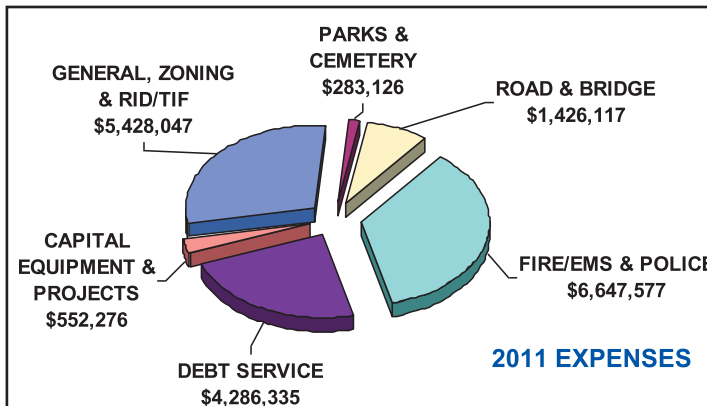
FINANCE DEPARTMENT REPORT

2011 LIBERTY TOWNSHIP FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- Liberty Township added a new restroom to Dudley Park with funding from an ODNR (Ohio Department of Natural Resources) grant, which is an added amenity along with the playground facility that was constructed in 2010.
- The debt service for the Service Department building was re-financed, which will save the Township an estimated \$66,000 for the term of the debt.
- Liberty Township received \$20,403 in recycling incentive revenue, which is an increase of approximately 7% from 2010. This revenue is used to help fund park expenditures.
- A new two-year contract was signed with Duke Energy Retail, which will save approximately \$80,000 on electricity for Township facilities. The new contract also includes all of the lighting district electricity accounts that are monitored by the Fiscal Officer.
- Various vendor contracts were renegotiated to help save the Township more than \$2,500.
- The Township's bond rating was updated to Aa1 from Aa2 by Moody's.
- Total revenues were \$19,948,089 compared with total expenditures of \$18,623,479. This is a net surplus of \$1,324,610.
- Total operating expenses came in 8% under budget.
- Total revenues exceeded budget by 25%.
