LIBERTY TOWNSHIP VISION PLAN WORK READY FOR PUBLIC FEEDBACK—OPEN HOUSE SET FOR JUNE 27 FROM 5-8 P.M.

On Thursday, June 27th, Liberty Township will host its third and final Open House for the 2013 Comprehensive Vision Plan Update. The open house will be held from 5:00 pm until 8:00 pm at the Township Administration Building, located at 6400 Princeton Road. Any interested resident or business owner is invited to come out and let us know what you think. There will be displays outlining all major aspects of the Draft Plan Update, including information about population and development trends, the business community, recreation, housing, transportation and utilities, schools and local government services. There will be opportunities for you to give your input on the plan in several different ways.

The Comprehensive Vision Plan is an update to the Township's 2006 Comprehensive Plan which was designed to be a 20-year planning tool to be updated approximately every five years. Last spring, with Liberty Township at the five-year mark since the 2006 adoption, a Vision Plan Steering Committee was formed representing the interests of residents, township businesses and community stakeholders. The Vision Plan Steering Committee continues to guide the process through a series of work sessions open to the public as well as two previous public open houses which were held in April and October last year.

The Comprehensive Vision Plan provides a vision for the future of Liberty Township. As time passes, the business climate changes, development patterns change, and what has been developed all change the landscape of our community. The plan becomes a guideline that is used to direct future growth, affect public policy, plan for greenways, parks, quality of life assets, and to ensure that Liberty Township continues to be a quality community.

From this point, the draft Comprehensive Vision Plan document will be produced and then sent to the Vision Plan Steering Committee for review. Once the draft plan is finalized, it will be adopted through a series of public hearings. News regarding the Vision Plan process, as well as documentation of the meetings is available on the Township's web site at www.liberty-township.com. You may comment on any of the materials or your own thoughts regarding development and services in the Township through a link on the web site.

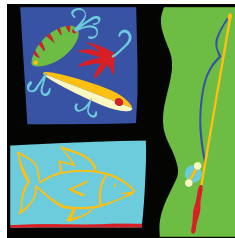

FIRE DEPARTMENT FLASH

LIBERTY TOWNSHIP FIRE DEPARTMENT COMPLETES ANNUAL HYDRANT INSPECTIONS

Liberty Township Fire Department crews have just completed our annual fire hydrant inspection program for 2013. Each fire hydrant that is located on a public water main within Liberty Township was tested to assure proper operation.

Fire hydrant inspection involves opening the valve and flowing water out of one or more of the outlets to see that it operates easily, shuts down completely and drains down after it is shut off. The outlet caps are also lubricated to make sure that they are free and can be removed quickly when needed. Additionally, the hydrant and the surrounding area is inspected for any obstructions that may inhibit easy access and recognition.



Being able to readily identify the water source when responding to a fire is necessary for an efficient fire attack and extinguishment when seconds count. We discourage landscaping and other obstructions that not only obscure the view but will no doubt hinder maintenance operations as well. Any defects or needed repairs are documented and reported to the Butler County Water & Sewer Department who is responsible for maintaining the water mains, valves and hydrants.

Fire hydrants on public water mains are to be painted safety yellow and ones on private mains are to be painted red. Painting them a different color or disguising them as another object may be cute but may make them hard to identify especially at night or in fog.

In the event that the device is not functional, our crews affix a red sign with 3 "white reflective letters indicating, at a glance, that it is "Out Of Service" (OOS). We also note the location of out of service hydrants in our response maps to aid in accessing an alternative water source. You may also notice hydrants with what appears to be a black garbage bag covering it. This is another way to designate that it is out of service that is often utilized by contractors.

If you notice water around hydrants or in the vicinity of water mains please report it to the Butler County Water & Sewer Department or Liberty Township Fire Department as soon as possible. The water department can test the water and determine if it is simply ground water or treated water from the main. We encourage residents to help maintain visibility around the hydrants near their property year round. Clearing snow around a hydrant in winter is an important task that neighbors can undertake if possible.

CW2 JODY L. EGNOR MEMORIAL HIGHWAY DEDICATED

A portion of State Route 747 in Liberty Township was dedicated to **United States Army Chief Warrant Officer 2 Jody L. Egnor** who died serving our country in February 2002. Egnor was a 1988 Lakota graduate and enlisted in the Army shortly after graduation. He was killed in a helicopter crash off the Phillipines during *Operation Enduring Freedom*. He was survived by his wife Janet (of Tennessee), his parents Roger and Margaret and sister Robin. The Egnors are long-time Liberty Township residents.

To honor their son, the Egnors participated in a dedication ceremony on April 20, 2013 as a portion of SR 747 in Liberty Township is now named for him. Remarks were made by family members as well as State Representative Margaret Conditt, State Senator William Coley and Township Trustees David Kern and Christine Matacic. The portion being dedicated begins at Tylersville Road and extends to just south of the SR 129 ramps.
