## LIBERTY TOWNSHIP'S VISIONS BECOME REALITY IN 2009



As we say goodbye to 2008, let's see what the township has to look forward to accomplishing in 2009 :

### 1. LIBERTY'S I-75 CONNECTION –

Liberty Interchange is almost here! The Ohio Department of Transportation and the Butler County Transportation Improvement District are working toward a 2010 completion date. This project includes the I-75 ramp connectors to Hamilton-Mason Road, the widening of Hamilton-Mason Road from Cincinnati-Dayton Road to Butler-Warren Road, and the extension of Cox Road. The final portion of the project, the expansion of Hamilton-Mason Road from Cincinnati-Dayton Road to Cox Road, began early January 2009 with an expected completion of October 2009. Traffic will be maintained throughout the expansion efforts (no road closures anticipated) which will open up more than 600 acres for commercial development.

### 2. PARKS MASTER PLAN –

The Liberty Township Parks & Recreation Steering Committee is in its final stages of completing the township's first ever Parks & Recreation Master Plan. The remaining schedule includes Public Open Houses where residents and business owners can come to view and comment on the draft plan. These Open Houses are scheduled for February 18, 2009 at 7:00 p.m. and February 26, 2009 at 7:00 p.m. Please mark your calendars and take part in planning the future for Liberty's parks. We look forward to the results as the Board of

Trustees, at its 2009 Organizational Meeting, made this a high priority.

### 3. FIREHOUSE RELOCATION –

For those who live and work in the northwest quadrant of the township, be on the look out for the construction of Firehouse #1 which is being relocated further north on State Route 747. Built in 1953 to service fire volunteers, the "Maustown" station requires expansion to accommodate a full-time, 24-hour Fire and Emergency Medical Services department. This new 11,000 square foot facility will provide more efficient and effective coverage for the growing needs of the community. Construction begins March 2009 with completion expected by the end of the year.

### 4. 2009 PRIORTIES –

At their Organizational Meeting on January 6, 2009, the Board of Trustees set forth a list of priorities it wished to pursue over the next 12 months. Some of those priorities include:

- begin discussions on a possible Interchange at Millikin Road and I-75;
- create a new logo/branding image for Liberty Township (expect to see new township signage in 2009);
- examine and prepare for potential township building improvements, relocations, and expansions;
- identify and prepare for upcoming major road improvements;
- reexamine the current land use plan, and
- finalize revisions and updates to the Zoning Resolution.

The Liberty Township Zoning Commission will hold their meetings on the first Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at Township Hall, 6400 Princeton Road. ### 2009 Planning and Zoning Department Goals

As part of the preparation of the 2009 Zoning Budget, the Board of Liberty Township Trustees and the Planning and Zoning Department has prepared a list of project goals for this year. The list below provides a basic outline of the project goals for 2009:

- Complete the revision to the Liberty Township Zoning Resolution. The Township has been working on a revision and update to the Township Zoning Resolution for the last year and a half with the help of a professional consultant. The goal is to bring the code up to current legal requirements, provide a

more user friendly code including more graphics, and easier to follow development regulations.

- Organize the Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee to review, evaluate, and update the Liberty Township Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Plan.
- Prepare a Downtown Bethany Neighborhood Business District Development

community identified locations for Trails and Greenways, as part of the adoption of the Comprehensive Plan in 2006. Working with the Liberty Township Trails Committee, we will be reviewing detailed locations for trails, identifying funding strategies, and prioritizing trail construction.

- Interchange Gateway Landscaping. Liberty Township is working on providing landscaping at the exit ramps of State Route 129 and Cincinnati-Dayton Road and the exit ramps of State Route 129 and State Route 747. In addition to landscaping, Liberty Township Gateway Signage will be provided to welcome residents and visitors to the community. This is an important strategy to promote community identity and continues our theme of creating a sense of place.

## LETTER FROM LIBERTY TOWNSHIP SERVICES DIRECTOR

The winter months bring with them the challenges of driving in conditions that I'm sure are not enjoyable to anyone. The Liberty Township Services Department will certainly make every effort to keep these hazardous road conditions as safe as possible for the traveling public during these times of ice and snow. With that in mind, I would like to offer a few tips that you as a township resident can do to allow for safe, timely, and effective removal of ice and snow from township roadways.

1. Remove any objects near roadways that could potentially be struck during snow and ice removal, such as basketball goals, bicycles, etc.
2. Don't pass a snow plow unless **absolutely** necessary.
3. Allow plenty of stopping distance; don't follow plow trucks too closely. This also reduces the chances of loose material hitting your vehicle.
4. Keep headlights on low beam.

5. Never assume that the snow plow operator can see you. Every plow has blind spots that reduce side and rear visibility.
6. Don't push snow from your driveway into the roadway. This can create a danger to motorists. Pile snow to the left side of drive as you face your house, specifically when clearing near the road. This will prevent the plow from dragging the pile across your driveway apron.
7. Park vehicles in your driveway when possible; allows the crews to clear the entire roadway from curb to curb.

**NOTE:** The Liberty Township Services Department is responsible for approximately 134 miles of roadway in the township and utilizes over 2,100 tons of salt in an average winter. We pre-treat township roads with a salt brine solution. This process leaves white lines in the roadway.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT FLASH

### New Medic Response Unit for Fire Department

Liberty Township Fire Department recently replaced the department's original Paramedic Response truck with a 2009 Chevrolet Suburban. The original apparatus was a Chevrolet K3500 truck fitted with a service body and was placed in service in 1999 when the department upgraded to paramedic level service. The paramedic response unit responds in tandem with one of our three front line ambulances to all emergency medical runs and provides two additional personnel as well as back up medical supplies. Once the patient is evaluated and loaded into the ambulance, it is determined if additional staff is needed to assist during the transport. At this point either one or both of the response unit's crew may transport with the ambulance or return to service for the next emergency. The use of such a vehicle eliminates the need for a fire engine to accompany the ambulance in the majority of cases. The cabinetry in the rear of the

new Suburban was built by Firefighter / Paramedic Ben Lapensee with approximately \$500.00 in materials. Commercially available organizers similar to this one often sell for well in excess of \$2,000.00.

### Fire Department Anticipates New Radio System

The Liberty Township Fire Department is looking forward to the activation of Butler County's new 800MHz public safety radio system. The new countywide system, funded by countywide sales tax, will provide emergency workers with a much needed tool that will not only increase efficiency but also greatly enhance safety. Five of the eight fire departments that Liberty Township borders have employed an 800 MHz analog radio system for many years making radio communication difficult during mutual responses. We purchased a few portable radios with grant funds several years ago to use when we responded into the surrounding jurisdictions but this was inadequate at best. Even with the departments that we share our current frequency with often become clogged as public safety agencies become busier. Wide spread events such as



the windstorms of last September totally gridlocked the existing system.

All of the transmitter sites and antenna towers are complete and the new digital 800 MHz system was recently tested to assure that it will provide communications in all areas. The existing VHF system has had several specific areas in Liberty Township where radio communications were impossible. All of the existing problem areas passed

including below grade in several heavy concrete structures. The new radio equipment is presently being installed in our apparatus and we have personnel attending "Train the Trainer" classes to be able to instruct our personnel on the operation of the new equipment.

The re-numbering of our apparatus and stations has also been completed. This will not only help facilitate new federal guidelines but will prevent confusion among similarly named apparatus operating on the same emergency scene. While there are still many steps and much coordination that must be completed before all Butler County agencies are fully operational on the new system, we are hoping to be taking advantage of the new technology by spring.

kee Road and State Route 129. They are specialists in the care of children from birth through the college years. This is the third location for Suburban Pediatrics in the region.

**United Dairy Farmers** is under construction next to Delhi Flower & Garden Center at Cincinnati-Dayton and Princeton Roads. They expect to open in Spring 2009.

**We Do Snow** plans to build a 10,000 square foot facility at 6900 Hamilton-Mason Road. The facility is being built specifically so that the snow removal company can service the Cincinnati Children's Liberty Campus. The company has been clearing snow and ice from the hospital's campuses since 2004. We Do Snow is operating out of a temporary facility this winter. Construction of the new facility is expected to begin in the coming months, with

doors opening in time for Winter 2009.
